PHIL ANGELIDES is the Chairman of the Apollo Alliance, a coalition of labor, business, environmental, and community organizations. He was the California State Treasurer from 1999-2007 and Democratic nominee for Governor of California in 2006.

SHARON BEARD is an industrial hygienist for the Workers Education and Training Program of the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences at Research Triangle Park, North Carolina.

DENISE BODE is CEO of the American Wind Energy Association, former corporation commissioner in Oklahoma, former leader of the American Clean Skies Foundation, and former head of the Independent Petroleum Association of America.

SHERROD BROWN, a former Congressman, is now a U.S. Senator from Ohio. Brown's interest in making Ohio the Silicon Valley of Alternative Energy began when he wrote Ohio's first solar energy law in 1977.

DAVID OSSIAN CAMERON is Assistant to the Director, Rail Conference, International Brotherhood of Teamsters.

ALLISON CHIN, a scientist in cancer and AIDS drug development, is president of the Sierra Club, which she joined in 1982. She resides in California and Virginia.

LARRY COHEN, a Philadelphia native, is president of the Communications Workers of America, which represents 700,000 workers. He became involved in the union as a state worker in New Jersey.

DAVID FOSTER is executive director of the Blue Green Alliance. From 1989-2006, he served as Director of United Steelworkers District 11, a 13-state region spanning from Minnesota to Washington State—including Alaska.

LEO W. GERARD is international president of the 850,000-member United Steelworkers and a vice president of the AFL-CIO. In his first full term, Gerard launched a wide range of initiatives that brought more than 350,000 workers into the union's ranks—a 60 percent increase.

BENJAMIN GOLDSTEIN is a policy analyst specializing in energy with the Center for American Progress.

BRACKEN HENDRICKS is a senior fellow with the Center for American Progress and focuses on climate change, energy independence, and environmental protection.

JAMES P. HOFFA is general president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. The union represents 1.4 million members organized under 21 Industrial Divisions that include virtually every occupation imaginable, both professional and non-professional, private sector and public sector.

JOSEPH (CHIP) HUGHES is the director of the Worker Education and Training Program of the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences.

LISA JACKSON, a chemical engineer, is head of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. She has 20 years of experience as an environmental regulator, including her recent three-year tenure leading the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection.

VAN JONES is Special Advisor for Green Jobs, Enterprise & Innovation at the White House Council on Environmental Quality. He is the president and founder of Green For All and author of *The Green Collar Economy*.

ANDY KING is national health, safety, and environment coordinator for the United Steelworkers Union in Canada. He helped develop the union's groundbreaking 2006 environmental policy statement, "Securing Our Children's World."

AMY KLOBUCHAR, a former prosecutor, became the first woman elected to represent the State of Minnesota in the U.S. Senate in 2006. Previously, Klobuchar served for eight years as the Hennepin County prosecutor, which includes Minneapolis and 45 suburbs.

JILL KUBIT is assistant director of Cornell University's Global Labor Institute in New York.

PETER LEHNER is the executive director of the Natural Resources Defense Council. Previously, he served as chief of the Environmental Protection Bureau of the New York State Attorney General's office for eight years.

DAVE LEGRANDE is director of occupational safety and health for the Communications Workers of America.

ANDREW LIGHT is a senior fellow at the Center for American Progress.

MARTIN O'MALLEY was elected Governor of Maryland in 2006. He is a former Assistant State's Attorney for Baltimore City, a member of the Baltimore City Council, and served six years as mayor of Baltimore.
